Overnight: Iran Threatens to Walk Islamabad

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Eleven hours of overnight reporting confirm what the closing hours of the daytime SITREP suggested: **the Pakistan-brokered US–Iran ceasefire is now formally near-collapse**. The Lebanon carve-out flagged as the most likely failure trigger 24 hours ago has produced exactly the failure mode predicted, and the additional escalations of the night make a Friday Islamabad talks opening visibly less likely than at the moment the truce was signed.

Six discrete escalation events defined the window. **First**, Iranian Deputy Foreign Minister Saeed Khatibzadeh told the BBC in an on-the-record interview that Israel’s continued Lebanon strikes are a “grave violation” of the ceasefire and described Israeli conduct as “something like genocide” — the first time an Iranian government official has used the genocide framing publicly during this war. Foreign Minister Abbas Araghchi posted a binary ultimatum on X that has now been quoted in fifteen-plus outlets across eight languages: “America must either choose the ceasefire or continue the war through Israel — he cannot do both at once.” **Second**, the Iranian Ambassador to Pakistan, Reza Amiri Moghadam, posted and then within hours **deleted** an X announcement confirming the Iranian delegation’s arrival in Islamabad — the first publicly visible signal that Iran is wavering on attendance at the Friday/Saturday talks. *The Wall Street Journal* (via *Middle East Monitor*) reported during the window that Iran is “formally threatening to withdraw from Saturday’s talks unless a Lebanon ceasefire is imposed” and “reconsidering whether to reopen the Strait of Hormuz at all.”

Third, Hezbollah launched a rocket barrage at Kibbutz Manara in northern Israel at 02:30 local time Thursday — the **first post-ceasefire Hezbollah strike** and a deliberate signal that the Lebanon front is now operationally active again. One rocket was intercepted by Iron Dome; no casualties reported, but the symbolic significance is large. The Israeli Defense Forces confirmed killing **Ali Yusuf Harshi**, the personal secretary and nephew of Hezbollah Secretary General Naim Qassem, in the Tallet Khayat strike on Beirut. A Reuters flash via *ABP News* later in the window made the unconfirmed claim that **Israel had killed Qassem himself** in an additional overnight strike — this remains uncorroborated by other sources at the time of writing and conflicts with the earlier “nephew only” reporting; treat as a high-significance forward signal pending confirmation.

Fourth, the Lebanon casualty figures were revised upward through the overnight window from an initial 182 dead through 203, then 250, finally settling at **254 killed and 1,160–1,165 wounded** in a single 24-hour period — confirming the Wednesday Beirut/Bekaa/southern Lebanon barrage as the bloodiest single day of the entire forty-day war. Cumulative Lebanese casualties since the front opened on March 2 now stand at **1,739 dead and 5,873**

wounded per the Lebanese Health Ministry, with 1.2 million displaced. Lebanese Prime Minister Nawaf Salam declared a national day of mourning. Lebanese Speaker Nabih Berri called the operation a “killing machine” act. Belgian Foreign Minister Maxime Prévot, on an official visit to Beirut, was reported by his own ministry to have been “narrowly missed” by an Israeli strike landing meters from his location.

Fifth, the Strait of Hormuz situation hardened from “effectively closed” to “publicly and structurally closed.” Iranian semi-official news agencies *ISNA* and *Tasnim* published an **IRGC-issued nautical chart** during the window marking a “danger zone” over the Strait’s main shipping lane and directing all unauthorized vessels to alternative routes near Larak Island that require pre-clearance through IRGC channels. This is the first quasi-public Iranian admission of mining the Strait. ADNOC CEO Sultan Al Jaber stated publicly that the Strait is “not open.” Only **4 vessels transited Wednesday** per Kpler tracking and **11 per Windward** — against the pre-war daily average of 130–138 ships. ~1,400 ships are now anchored on both sides of the chokepoint; ~426 tankers remain stuck in the Persian Gulf per MarineTraffic. Maersk publicly announced refusal to return until further notice. Iran’s transit-fee proposal hardened from negotiable to formal: **\$2 million per VLCC, payable in Bitcoin or Chinese yuan**, split 50/50 with Oman. *Lloyd’s List* dubbed the new regime the “Tehran Tollgate.” European leaders rejected it across the board: French Foreign Minister Jean-Noël Barrot called it “illegal” and “against the common good of humanity,” UK Foreign Secretary Yvette Cooper said maritime freedoms “cannot be sold to individual bidders,” Greek Prime Minister Mitsotakis called it “completely unacceptable,” and the German Foreign Office invoked UNCLOS. UAE’s Anwar Gargash separately called the toll “completely unacceptable.” Trump simultaneously floated a US–Iran “joint venture” arrangement to co-collect the tolls — “a beautiful thing” — which the EU collectively rejected as a violation of international navigation law.

Sixth, the trans-Atlantic alliance worsened materially. President Trump posted three Truth Social messages overnight: “NATO WASN’T THERE WHEN WE NEEDED THEM, AND THEY WON’T BE THERE IF WE NEED THEM AGAIN,” a parallel re-escalation of his Greenland claim (“REMEMBER GREENLAND, THAT BIG, POORLY RUN, PIECE OF ICE!!!”), and a “shootin’ starts, bigger and better and stronger than anyone has ever seen before” warning that US ships, aircraft, personnel, and munitions remain “in and around Iran” awaiting the outcome of talks. *The Wall Street Journal* report on the planned 84,000-troop redeployment from Spain, Germany, Italy, and France to Poland, Romania, Lithuania, and Greece was widely echoed in Spanish, German, Korean, and Turkish press during the window — including the specific identification of bases at risk (Rota and Morón in Spain; Ramstein, Spangdahlem, Kaiserslautern, Grafenwöhr, and Wiesbaden in Germany; the F-22-related US presence in Italy and France). NATO Secretary General Mark Rutte’s closed-door meeting with Trump produced a single notable artifact: per *Der Spiegel*, Trump issued a “de-facto ultimatum” demanding concrete European warship and military commitments to a Hormuz freedom-of-navigation mission “within days.” Press Secretary Karoline Leavitt, asked about UK Foreign Secretary Cooper’s offer of British naval assistance, replied: “they were tested and they failed.” Former US Ambassador to NATO Ivo Daalder, in a CNN International appearance, called the alliance “in its worst crisis ever” and described the Iran war as “a strategic blunder of historic proportion.”

Underneath all of this, *The New York Times* published the most consequential investigative piece of the night: a Maggie Haberman / Jonathan Swan reconstruction (excerpted from their forthcoming book *Regime Change*) of the internal White House decision-making that produced Operation Epic Fury. The reporting, based on dozens of administration sources, establishes that Prime Minister Netanyahu pitched a four-step regime-change plan to Trump in a near-secret February 11 Situation Room meeting attended by Mossad chief David Barnea via videoconference. The four steps: decapitate Khamenei, paralyze the Iranian military, trigger a popular uprising, install a secular leader — explicitly named as Reza Pahlavi or Kurdish opposition elements. **CIA Director Ratcliffe called the plan “absurd” and “ridiculous.” Secretary of State Rubio called it “shit” and “complete nonsense.” Joint Chiefs Chairman General Dan Caine warned that US Patriot, THAAD, and Tomahawk inventories were at “minimum levels” from prior Ukraine and Israel draws. Vice President Vance, asked his view, said: “I think it’s a bad idea, but if you want to do it, I’ll support you.”** Trump approved the operation aboard Air Force One on

February 27 — twenty-two minutes before Caine’s self-imposed cancellation deadline — after Ratcliffe flagged a daylight window in which Khamenei would be at his Tehran residence. Trump’s exact authorization phrase, per the reporting: “*That works for me. No cancellations. Good luck.*” The Pahlavi-restoration scenario surfacing now in print on Day 41 of the war, attributed to direct Netanyahu sourcing, is the strongest documented evidence to date that Israel’s strategic objective was always regime change rather than nuclear program degradation.

The window closed at 8 AM EDT with the ceasefire still technically intact but with every operational and diplomatic indicator pointing toward a higher-probability collapse than at the moment of signing. Trump’s domestic political position deteriorated in parallel: 85-plus House Democrats and two Senators are now publicly calling for invocation of the 25th Amendment after the “whole civilization will die tonight” Truth Social post; Illinois Governor JB Pritzker said publicly Trump “must leave now”; Representative Jamie Raskin scheduled a Friday morning constitutional briefing for House Democrats on Section 4 procedures. The Department of Justice arrested **Courtney Williams**, a former special-operations administrative custodian at Fort Bragg, on charges of leaking classified defense information to journalist Seth Harp — a move that comes within 24 hours of Trump publicly threatening to “jail journalists” over a leaked story about a downed US airman missing on Iranian soil. *CBS News* separately published survivor testimony from the March 1 Shahed drone strike on Port of Shuaiba in Kuwait — six US service members killed, the deadliest attack on US forces since 2021 — directly contradicting Defense Secretary Hegseth’s official narrative that the attack was an unforeseeable “squirter that bypassed defenses.” The survivors say their unit had “none” in air defense, that the post was on a known target list, and that other units had moved out to “get off the X” while the 103rd Sustainment Command was moved in. The Hegseth credibility collapse continues to widen.

The next 24 hours determine whether the truce survives the weekend. The Friday Islamabad talks (now slipped to Saturday April 11 in most reports) remain on the calendar. Iran’s attendance is now publicly conditional. The Lebanon front is operationally active. Hormuz is structurally closed. The Mojtaba Khamenei succession remains shrouded — multiple sources flagged during the window that the new Supreme Leader has not appeared publicly since the war began and may be wounded, incapacitated, or dead.

10 MAJOR DEVELOPMENTS

1. Iran Threatens to Walk Islamabad Talks; Khatibzadeh Uses “Genocide” Framing on the Record

The most significant escalation of the window is rhetorical and diplomatic, not kinetic. Iranian Deputy Foreign Minister Saeed Khatibzadeh told the *BBC* in an on-the-record interview that Israel’s continued Lebanon strikes are a “grave violation” of the ceasefire and described Israeli conduct as “something like genocide.” This is the first time an Iranian government official has invoked the genocide framing publicly during the Iran war proper. Foreign Minister Abbas Araghchi separately posted a binary ultimatum on X — “America will have to choose between the ceasefire or continuing the war through Israel; he cannot do both at once” — that has now been quoted across fifteen-plus outlets in eight languages ([BBC](#), [WSJ via MEMO](#), [Asharq](#), [Le Parisien](#), [WELT](#)).

Iranian Ambassador to Pakistan **Reza Amiri Moghadam** posted, then within hours **deleted**, an X announcement confirming the delegation’s arrival in Islamabad. *The Wall Street Journal* (via Middle East Monitor) reported that Iran is “formally threatening to withdraw from Saturday’s talks unless a Lebanon ceasefire is imposed” and is “reconsidering whether to reopen the Strait of Hormuz at all” ([WSJ via MEMO](#)). Iranian Parliament Speaker Mohammad Bagher Ghalibaf called the talks “unreasonable” and “irrational.” Vice President Vance dismissed all of this as a “legitimate misunderstanding” and reportedly mocked Ghalibaf’s English comprehension on the record.

Iranian Parliament Speaker Ghalibaf publicly enumerated three of ten ceasefire framework points already violated: (a) Israel's continued Lebanon war, (b) an Israeli drone intrusion shot down over Lar in Fars province by what the IRGC called a "new air defense system," and (c) the unresolved uranium enrichment rights question that constitutes the sixth point of the Iranian framework ([NDTV](#), [Hindustan Times](#), [Al Jazeera](#), [Le Monde](#), [Gulf News](#), [CGTN](#)). Press Secretary Leavitt's response — that Iran's published 10-point plan was "literally thrown in the garbage" and replaced with a "fundamentally unserious" revised version more aligned with a US 15-point counter-plan — directly contradicts Trump's own Tuesday statement that the original 10-point document was a "workable basis" for negotiation.

2. Lebanon Death Toll Confirmed at 254; Hezbollah Strikes Back at 02:30

The Wednesday Lebanon casualty figures were revised upward through the overnight window from initial reports of 182 dead through 203, then 250, settling at the Lebanese Health Ministry's final count of **254 killed and 1,160–1,165 wounded in a single 24-hour period** ([Asharq](#), [Al Jazeera](#), [Guardian](#), [CBC](#), [El País](#)). This is now confirmed as the bloodiest single day of the entire forty-day war and the deadliest Lebanese day since the September 2024 pager operation. Cumulative Lebanese casualties since the front opened on March 2 stand at **1,739 dead and 5,873 wounded**, with 1.2 million displaced — approximately 20% of the country's population — and Israeli evacuation orders covering 15% of national territory. 130 children are among the dead.

Operation "Eternal Darkness" (the *Asharq*-attributed name for the Wednesday strike package) deployed approximately 50 Israeli aircraft dropping ~160 munitions on more than 100 Hezbollah-linked targets in a 10-minute window across Beirut's southern suburbs, the Bekaa Valley, and southern Lebanon. The strikes confirmed killed **Ali Yusuf Harshi**, the personal secretary and nephew of Hezbollah Secretary General Naim Qassem, in the Tallet Khayat district of Beirut. The IDF separately destroyed the last bridge over the Litani River, severing the southern Lebanon front. Belgian Foreign Minister Maxime Prévot, on an official visit to Beirut at the time, was reported by his ministry to have been "narrowly missed" by an Israeli strike landing close to his location.

Hezbollah retaliated with a rocket barrage at Kibbutz Manara in northern Israel at **02:30 local time Thursday** — the **first post-ceasefire Hezbollah strike**. One rocket was intercepted by Iron Dome; no casualties were reported but the operational signal is unambiguous: the Lebanon front is now active again. The IDF Northern Command reportedly said in closed-door briefings that it expected sustained rocket fire to resume within hours. A Reuters flash via *ABP News* later in the window made the unconfirmed claim that **Israel had killed Naim Qassem himself** in an additional overnight Beirut strike — this conflicts with the earlier "nephew only" reporting and remains uncorroborated by IDF spokespeople or Hezbollah. Treat as a high-significance forward signal pending confirmation.

3. Strait of Hormuz Hardens from "Effectively" to "Structurally" Closed

The Strait of Hormuz situation moved from "effectively closed in practice" to "structurally and publicly closed by Iranian fiat." Iranian semi-official news agencies *ISNA* and *Tasnim* published an **IRGC-issued nautical chart** during the window marking a "danger zone" over the main shipping lane and directing all unauthorized vessels to alternative routes near Larak Island requiring pre-clearance through IRGC channels — the first quasi-public Iranian admission of having mined the Strait ([ISNA](#), [Tasnim](#), [Lloyd's List](#)).

ADNOC CEO Sultan Al Jaber stated publicly that the Strait is "not open" and that Iran is controlling transit "via permission, conditions, and political leverage" ([Globes](#)). Only **4 vessels transited Wednesday** per Kpler maritime tracking and **11 per Windward** — against the pre-war daily average of 130–138 ships. **~1,400 vessels are now anchored on both sides of the chokepoint; ~426 tankers remain stuck in the Persian Gulf** per MarineTraffic; 230

oil-loaded tankers are reportedly ready to move. Maersk publicly refused to return until further notice. Hapag-Lloyd estimated minimum six weeks to return to pre-war throughput levels even under a best-case clearance scenario.

Iran's transit-fee regime hardened from negotiable to formal during the window: **\$2 million per VLCC, payable in Bitcoin or Chinese yuan**, with revenues split 50/50 between Tehran and Muscat ([Lloyd's List](#), [Makor Rishon](#), [CBC](#), [NYT](#)). *Lloyd's List* dubbed the new structure the **"Tehran Tollgate."** Projected revenue: roughly **\$500 billion over five years** at full throughput. European rejection was uniform and unequivocal: French FM Barrot called the toll "illegal" and "contrary to the common good of humanity"; UK FS Yvette Cooper said maritime freedoms "cannot be sold to individual bidders"; Greek PM Mitsotakis called it "completely unacceptable" and a "dangerous precedent"; the German Foreign Office invoked UNCLOS Article 38; UAE's Anwar Gargash called it "completely unacceptable." Trump, in a separate Truth Social post, simultaneously floated a US–Iran "joint venture" to co-collect the tolls — "a beautiful thing" — which the EU collectively rejected as a violation of international navigation law. Press Secretary Leavitt's parallel insistence that the Strait remains "open and safe" with an "uptick of traffic" was directly contradicted by every shipping data feed available.

The Sorbonne maritime law professor Philippe Delebecque told *PBS NewsHour*, in remarks echoed during the window, that institutionalized Hormuz tolls would "mean the end of international maritime society" with direct precedent risk for the Taiwan Strait, the Strait of Malacca, and the Strait of Gibraltar. *Atlantic* magazine published a long-form analysis during the window titled "China Watches Trump Blink" arguing that Beijing will replicate the Hormuz playbook on Taiwan — citing US munitions depletion (~10% cruise missiles, ~25% THAAD interceptors expended in 39 days), Pew polling that Americans are more worried about gas prices than US casualties, and CSIS war-game results suggesting that any attempt to break a Taiwan blockade would cost "hundreds of US ships."

4. NYT/Haberman/Swan Book: How Trump Approved the War in 22 Minutes

The New York Times published the most consequential investigative piece of the window: a Maggie Haberman / Jonathan Swan reconstruction (excerpted from their forthcoming book *Regime Change*) of the internal White House decision-making that produced Operation Epic Fury ([NYT](#)). The reporting, based on dozens of administration sources, establishes the following timeline:

February 11, 2026. Prime Minister Netanyahu and Mossad chief David Barnea (via secure videoconference) presented a four-step regime-change PowerPoint in the Situation Room. The four steps: (1) decapitate Khamenei via simultaneous strikes on his residence and command nodes; (2) paralyze the Iranian military through systematic destruction of air defense, missile, and naval infrastructure; (3) trigger a popular uprising through the IRGC's collapse; (4) install a secular leader — explicitly named as Reza Pahlavi (the exiled crown prince of the Pahlavi dynasty) or Kurdish opposition elements.

The internal reaction. CIA Director John Ratcliffe called the plan "absurd" and "ridiculous." Secretary of State Marco Rubio called it "shit" and "complete nonsense." Joint Chiefs Chairman General Dan Caine warned that US Patriot, THAAD, and Tomahawk inventories were at "minimum levels" from prior Ukraine and Israel draws — a warning that turned out to be operationally prophetic, since by Day 39 the United States had burned ~10% of its cruise missile inventory and ~25% of its THAAD interceptor stocks. Vice President Vance, asked his view, said on the record: *"I think it's a bad idea, but if you want to do it, I'll support you."*

February 27, aboard Air Force One. Trump approved the operation **twenty-two minutes before Caine's self-imposed cancellation deadline**, after Ratcliffe flagged a daylight window in which Khamenei would be at his Tehran residence. Trump's exact authorization phrase, per the reporting: *"That works for me. No cancellations. Good luck."* Operation Epic Fury (also reported as "Operation Epic Wrath" / "Operation Lion's Roar" depending on outlet) launched in the predawn hours of February 28.

The Pahlavi-restoration scenario surfacing in print now, on Day 41, attributed to direct Netanyahu sourcing, is the strongest documented evidence to date that Israel’s strategic objective was always **regime change rather than nuclear program degradation**. Reza Pahlavi himself, in a French *LCI* interview during the window, explicitly contradicted Trump’s claim that “regime change” had been achieved: “For us, this was not a regime change. The same people are still in power.”

5. Trump–NATO Rupture Hardens; *Der Spiegel*: “De Facto Ultimatum”

The trans-Atlantic alliance worsened materially during the window. President Trump posted three Truth Social messages overnight that European officials described variously as a “rupture,” a “dismantling,” and “the worst NATO crisis since 1956.” The exact text of the most-quoted post: **“NATO WASN’T THERE WHEN WE NEEDED THEM, AND THEY WON’T BE THERE IF WE NEED THEM AGAIN.”** A parallel post re-escalated his Greenland claim: **“REMEMBER GREENLAND, THAT BIG, POORLY RUN, PIECE OF ICE!!!”** Press Secretary Karoline Leavitt, asked specifically about UK Foreign Secretary Yvette Cooper’s offer of British naval assistance to a Hormuz freedom-of-navigation mission, replied: *“They were tested and they failed.”*

The Wall Street Journal report on the **84,000-troop redeployment plan** was widely echoed during the window in Spanish (*El Periódico, La Razón*), German (*WELT, FAZ, T-Online*), Korean (*Kyunghyang Shinmun*), Italian (*La Repubblica*), and Turkish (*Sabah*) press. Bases identified as at risk: **Rota and Morón in Spain; Ramstein, Spangdahlem, Kaiserslautern, Grafenwöhr, and Wiesbaden in Germany**; the F-22 forward presence in Italy; specific French air force coordination installations. Beneficiaries of the relocation: Poland, Romania, Lithuania, Greece. *WELT* identified France, Italy, and Spain as Trump’s “Querulanten-Trio” — the three “complainers” who refused military overflights during the war.

NATO Secretary General Mark Rutte’s closed-door White House meeting Wednesday produced one decisive artifact reported during the overnight window: per *Der Spiegel*, Trump issued a **“de-facto ultimatum”** demanding concrete European warship and military commitments to a Hormuz freedom-of-navigation mission “within days.” Rutte, in his post-meeting press appearance, acknowledged Trump’s “frank” complaints, said “not all European nations lived up to commitments,” and warned in a separate CNN interview of a possible “North Korean moment” for the alliance if European response is inadequate. Former US Ambassador to NATO **Ivo Daalder** called the alliance “in its worst crisis ever” and described the Iran war as “a strategic blunder of historic proportion.” Italian Defense Minister and Premier Giorgia Meloni floated suspending the EU Stability Pact — mirroring the COVID framework — “if Iran war escalates further.” French Foreign Minister Barrot, French President Macron, and Spanish Prime Minister Pedro Sánchez each gave separate public statements during the window asserting that Lebanon ceasefire inclusion is a “necessary condition” for any meaningful peace track.

Korean outlet *Kyunghyang Shinmun* surfaced a new and locally significant data point: Trump reportedly told NATO interlocutors that **South Korea is also on the “non-supporters” list** for refusing to commit USFK assets to Hormuz operations — opening a new Pacific dimension to the rupture and creating implicit USFK exposure for Seoul.

6. The Trump Domestic Political Collapse Accelerates

The 25th Amendment movement reached new highs during the overnight window. **85-plus House Democrats and two sitting Senators** are now publicly calling for invocation of Section 4 after Trump’s “whole civilization will die tonight” Truth Social post. Illinois Governor JB Pritzker said publicly that Trump “must leave now.” Representative Jamie Raskin scheduled a Friday morning constitutional briefing for House Democrats on Section 4 procedures. House Minority Leader Hakeem Jeffries attempted a unanimous-consent war powers resolution in a pro forma session and announced his intent to force a Senate vote next week. Republican congressional leadership remained, in *NBC News*’s phrasing, “notably silent” — Speaker Johnson tweeted about transgender athletes during the

window, House Armed Services Committee Chair tweeted about Trump-branded child investment accounts, and the Foreign Affairs Committee Chair posted baby chick photos.

The Department of Justice arrested **Courtney Williams** (40, North Carolina), a former special-operations administrative custodian at Fort Bragg with custody access to Delta Force fake passport records and front-company documentation, on charges of leaking classified defense information to journalist **Seth Harp** for his book *The Fort Bragg Cartel*. The arrest came within twenty-four hours of Trump publicly threatening to “jail journalists” over a leaked story about a downed US airman missing on Iranian soil for two days armed only with a sidearm.

CBS News separately published survivor testimony from the **March 1 Shahed drone strike on Port of Shuaiba in Kuwait** — six US service members killed and 20-plus wounded, the deadliest single attack on US forces since 2021. The survivors directly contradicted Defense Secretary Hegseth’s official narrative that the attack was an unforeseeable “squinter that bypassed defenses.” On the record, the surviving members of the 103rd Sustainment Command said their unit had “none” in air defense capability against aerial drones, that the post was on a known target list, that T-walls are “useless against aerial attacks,” and that **other units had moved out to “get off the X” while the 103rd was being moved in**. The Hegseth credibility collapse continues to widen across multiple anonymous-administration-official, Pentagon-insider, and now first-person survivor sources.

Polling registered the political damage in real terms. *Navigator Research* found 65% of Americans disapprove of Trump’s handling of oil prices and 71% blame the Iran war. *NYT* poll aggregate puts Trump’s approval at **39%**. Reuters/Ipsos: **75% of Americans now oppose the Iran war**. *JPPI* polling of the US Jewish community shows war support down from 68% to 62%; belief that the war damages Israel’s image up from 45% to 56%; belief that the war increases antisemitism up from 52% to 65%. The intra-Jewish-community partisan split is the sharpest yet measured: **98% of Trump voters in the JPPI sample support the war; among Harris voters the split is 49% opposed / 40% support**.

Kalshi prediction-market spreads continue to register the political damage. Cancellation of the GOP House majority in the November midterms is now trading at >50% probability for the first time in the cycle.

7. The Mojtaba Khamenei Succession Crisis

Multiple outlets surfaced the same disturbing observation during the window: **the new Iranian Supreme Leader has not appeared publicly since the war began**. *BILD* (Germany), citing Iranian opposition figure Bijan Djir-Sarai, reported that Mojtaba Khamenei may be dead or incapacitated. *T-Online* reported Iranian-source observations that he is “severely injured” and that observers in the IRGC senior officer corps “now hold real power.” *Stern* covered the public memorial held in Tehran at 9:40 AM local time on April 9 to mark the exact moment of the February 28 strike on the elder Khamenei’s residence — but the memorial was conducted entirely without Mojtaba’s physical presence. Iranian Deputy Speaker Ali Nikzad had stated earlier in the week that “Mojtaba will not allow an agreement unless all ten conditions are met” — but no on-the-record statement from Mojtaba himself has been produced since the succession was announced.

Le Grand Continent (France) published a long analytical piece during the window framing the current Iranian power structure as “the Regime of Guardians” rather than the “Regime of Mullahs”: with Hossein Salami killed in June 2025 and IRGC Commander Mohammad Pakpour killed on March 1, 2026, the IRGC is now commanded by Ahmad Vahidi, with strategic decisions driven by Parliament Speaker Ghalibaf and SNSC Secretary Zolghadr. The Assembly of Experts confirmation of Mojtaba was reportedly contested — approximately 25 of 88 members opposed the succession on the grounds that Mojtaba lacks the required religious credentials, an unprecedented level of dissent within the body.

The geopolitical implication is significant: if Mojtaba is in fact dead or incapacitated and the IRGC is making decisions through Vahidi, Ghalibaf, and Zolghadr, then the Friday/Saturday Islamabad talks are being conducted

with an Iranian delegation whose authorizing principal is functionally fictional. Brookings's Shibley Telhami's earlier observation — that the elder Khamenei's anti-nuclear *fatwa* dies with the man who issued it — now compounds with a second-order effect: any successor declaration is also legitimacy-contested, removing both the religious and the procedural bars against an Iranian sprint to a weapon.

8. Insider-Trading Scandal Metastasizes

The pre-existing prediction-market and oil-futures insider-trading scandal expanded materially during the overnight window. *BILD* (Germany), *Financial Times*, and *Der Standard* (Austria) independently reported during the window that **a \$500 million directional bet on falling oil futures was placed approximately 15 minutes before Trump's March 23 "productive talks" Truth Social post** — the move that triggered the first major oil-price decline of the war and predated the eventual ceasefire by 16 days. Blockchain-analytics firm Bubblemaps, which tracks Polymarket wallet activity, reported that **six accounts collectively earned \$1.2 million on bets that Khamenei would be killed** — bets which were reportedly funded *hours before* the February 28 strike on Khamenei's residence.

A separate strand of the scandal: a broker connected to Defense Secretary Hegseth's personal financial circle is reportedly under examination for a roughly \$1 million pre-war investment in defense-sector instruments. Senator Chris Murphy (D-CT) called the pattern "unfathomable, dizzying corruption" and said he is preparing legislation banning all administration officials, family members, and associates from holding positions in defense or commodity instruments during foreign policy crises. The SEC has not publicly opened an investigation, but congressional Democrats are signaling that they will use the Senate war-powers resolution as a vehicle to force one.

9. The Hegseth–Caine Public Split

The internal Pentagon credibility split that emerged in earlier reporting widened publicly during the overnight window. At the same Pentagon press conference on Wednesday, **Defense Secretary Hegseth declared the operation a "historic and overwhelming victory," "Iran begged for ceasefire," and a "capital V military victory."** **Joint Chiefs Chairman General Dan Caine, standing at the same lectern, called the operation a "pause" rather than an "end"** and emphasized 13 KIA and continuing operational risk. *Merkur* (Germany) explicitly contrasted the two framings as "diametrically opposed." *CNN Arabic* analysis during the window noted that the Pentagon's "450 ballistic missile storage facilities + 800 drone storage facilities destroyed" claim provides no baseline or denominator — and that *CNN's* own intelligence sources estimate **~50% of Iranian missile launchers remain intact** with thousands of one-way attack drones still in arsenal. *Le Monde* cited Jeffrey Lewis (James Martin Center for Nonproliferation Studies): "The survival of the regime plus 440 kg of HEU equals a humiliating defeat for the United States."

Hegseth additionally publicly rebuked a female journalist at the press conference as "very rude," sparking secondary controversy. Reports during the window surfaced that **12 senior US military officers have been dismissed during the war** and that war-crimes legal advisors have been quietly removed from the operational planning chain. The sum effect is to compound the credibility gap from "anonymous senior administration officials say Hegseth is not speaking truth to the President" (yesterday's reporting) into "the Joint Chiefs Chairman is publicly contradicting the Defense Secretary at the same press conference" (today's reporting).

10. Russia's Quiet Windfall and the Ukraine Linkage

While the public narrative focused on Lebanon and Hormuz, Russia quietly recorded the largest budgetary windfall of the year. *DW Russian* and *Finam Capital* reported that **Russian April oil tax revenue is projected to double from March's 327 billion rubles to approximately 700 billion rubles (\$9 billion)** as a direct result of the Hormuz-

induced price spike. **Urals crude averaged \$77 per barrel in March, up 73% from February’s \$44.59 — the highest level since October 2023.** Spot price for Urals at Primorsk hit **\$116.05 on April 2**, approximately double the Kremlin’s \$59-per-barrel federal budget assumption. ISW noted during the window that **the United States has temporarily loosened sanctions on Russian oil exports** as a result of the Hormuz-induced price pressure — a Treasury Secretary Bessent waiver issued March 12 has the practical effect of allowing Russian crude to sell at premiums *above* the Brent benchmark.

The Ukrainian linkage is direct. Ukrainian President Zelensky, in a podcast appearance during the window (*The Rest is Politics*), made the most operationally specific claim of the night: **“Russian military satellites are providing Iran with targeting data on US bases and Israeli sites.”** He further noted that Trump envoys Steve Witkoff and Jared Kushner have made **5 trips to Moscow and 0 trips to Kyiv** during the war, and said: “The problem is that they trust Putin.” *INSS* (Israel) published a parallel analysis during the window framing the Russia–Iran defense relationship as now “symmetrical”: Iran has built a UAV manufacturing facility 800 km from Moscow, and Russian air defense components are reportedly being provided to Iran on a six-month repair turnaround. The strategic warning embedded in the *INSS* piece: if the United States is bogged down in an Iran follow-on, Russia has the operational space to “complete the Ukraine conquest and push into the Baltics or Poland.”

Ukrainian drone strikes against Russian Baltic export terminals (Ust-Luga, Primorsk, Lukoil-Nizhnenovgorodskintez) reportedly knocked out approximately 17% of Russian oil export capacity in the first week of April — but the price-effect of Hormuz closure dwarfed the supply effect of the Ukrainian strikes, leaving Russia net-positive on the war.

The following developments registered across one to three sources during the overnight window and have not yet reached the threshold of major-story coverage. Several have material strategic significance:

- **Reuters/ABP unconfirmed flash: Israel killed Hezbollah Secretary General Naim Qassem.** This conflicts with the earlier and confirmed “nephew only” reporting. Treat as a high-significance forward signal pending corroboration. If true, the Lebanon front escalates immediately to Hezbollah-leadership-decapitation status.
- **Meduza unconfirmed claim: Iran shot down a US F-15 and a crewman was stranded on Iranian soil for two days armed only with a pistol.** No US confirmation yet. If true, the Hegseth “degraded enemy” framing collapses entirely.
- **Microsoft’s Brad Smith floats “protected data centers” concept in response to specific Iranian threats against the OpenAI Stargate / G42 construction site in Abu Dhabi** — categorizing AI data centers as military infrastructure for the first time in public discourse. Eric Schmidt’s 2024 prediction of data centers guarded by military bases is materializing.
- **Iranian sea mines in the Strait of Hormuz publicly confirmed by the IRGC for the first time.** *Tasnim* and *ISNA* published the danger-zone chart with Farsi-language annotations over the Traffic Separation Scheme — possibly as leverage ahead of the Islamabad talks.
- **Costa Rica designates IRGC, Hezbollah, Hamas, and the Houthis as terrorist organizations.** First Latin American government to do so during the war.
- **Karachi Port emerging as structural Hormuz bypass.** The port handled more transshipment in the first 24 days of March than in all of 2025; broke a 138-year tradition by remaining open during Eid; cut port fees 60%; DP World terminal volume up +2,302% month-over-month. This is beyond opportunism — it suggests permanent restructuring of South Asian maritime flows.
- **North Korea testing Iran-war-informed weapons systems.** KN-23 with cluster-munition warhead, carbon-fiber graphite “blackout bombs” for electric grids, low-cost-material missile engines for mass production, new mobile SAM. Multiple test firings during the window. Hong Min (KINU): NK is “incorporating key weapons systems used [in Iran] into its own ability to deter and fight.”
- **Saudi-Iran first foreign minister phone call since the war began.** Saudi FM Faisal bin Farhan and Iranian FM Araghchi held a tension-reduction call during the window. First substantive Saudi-Iran direct contact since February 28. *Riyadh Daily* called it “a small but real signal.”
- **Bushehr nuclear safety warning.** IAEA flagged a “very real threat to nuclear safety” near the Bushehr nuclear plant; Russia’s Foreign Ministry warned of potential “Chernobyl-scale radiological catastrophe.” First overnight surfacing of this concern in the current cycle.
- **Iran specifically threatens the OpenAI Stargate data center construction site in Abu Dhabi.** First named threat against a US AI infrastructure project.
- **Israel quietly approved 34 new West Bank settlements on April 1,** kept secret at US request during the war. Total settlements approved since the current government formed: 102. IDF Chief of Staff Eyal Zamir warned the IDF could “collapse” under the burden of providing security for the new settlements.
- **Bank of England Chair Andrew Bailey warned the European Parliament that Iran-war-induced volatility may be triggering the first stress in opaque private credit markets.** Drew an explicit subprime-crisis comparison.
- **NATO “Coalition of the Willing” Persian Gulf naval mission as “tribute” to Trump.** Multiple sources flagged that NATO is considering a face-saving deployment outside the formal NATO command structure to be folded back into NATO at the July Ankara summit.
- **Iran offering Hormuz waivers specifically to Spain and Turkey** — designed to split NATO. Not yet accepted by either capital but the offer itself is a meaningful diplomatic move.

- **Trump 50% punitive tariff threat against any country supplying weapons to Iran** — aimed at China and Russia. The February SCOTUS ruling stripped IEEPA broad tariff authority, but the threat itself signals further trade-war escalation.
- **Iranian “narrative war” infrastructure surfacing.** The *Akhbar Enfejari* (“Explosive News”) Telegram channel — producing Lego-style AI-generated viral animations mocking Trump and Hegseth — is now reportedly operating from approximately 50 production houses with state coordination. Cambridge Disinformation Lab and WITNESS analysts called the production volume “incredibly worrying.” Separately, fake AI persona “Jessica Foster” (1M+ Instagram followers) posing as a US officer is now confirmed as a coordinated influence operation.
- **Ramzan Kadyrov reorientation.** The Chechen leader publicly denied that Chechen units would fight for Iran, explicitly condemned Iranian strikes on UAE/KSA/Bahrain civilian infrastructure, and emphasized “brotherly ties” with the Gulf rulers. Signals Russian-Islamic-world fracture over Iran’s Gulf targeting.
- **Bangladesh political realignment.** The Tariq Rahman / BNP government that took power in February 2026 is actively rolling back the Yunus-era China tilt. Bangladesh FM Khalilur Rahman is on a 3-day India visit during the window. The Lalmonirhat airstrip (Chicken’s Neck) Chinese-assisted proposal is reportedly dead.
- **Ray Dalio: “early stages of a world war.”** The Bridgewater founder, in a *Bloomberg* interview during the window, explicitly invoked 1913–14 and 1938–39 parallels, said there is a >50% probability of one current conflict going hot in the next 5 years, and called the United States “the most overextended major power” and “the one least able to endure long-term suffering.”
- **VP Vance’s CPAC straw-poll standing** has jumped to 53% for the 2028 Republican primary, up from 3% year-over-year. Rubio at 35%. Reportedly, Rubio has told aides he would support Vance in 2028. Vance’s lead role in the Islamabad talks is now widely interpreted as 2028-positioning.

NARRATIVE DIVERGENCES

The single most consequential narrative divergence remains the **Lebanon scope dispute**. Pakistan’s Sharif, Iran’s Araghchi, Iranian President Pezeshkian, Hezbollah’s leadership, France (Macron, Barrot), the EU (Kallas), the UK (Cooper), and Spain (Sánchez) all maintain that the ceasefire covers Lebanon. Trump, Vance, Netanyahu, IDF Chief Zamir, Israeli FM Saar, and White House Press Secretary Leavitt all explicitly state the opposite. Vance’s framing — “legitimate misunderstanding,” followed by his on-the-record remark mocking Ghalibaf’s English comprehension — has now been quoted across virtually every major outlet covering the story. This is no longer an interpretive ambiguity; it is a flat factual disagreement on the operative terms of the agreement, sustained by all parties for irreconcilable domestic-audience reasons.

A second sharp divergence emerged within the **same Pentagon press conference**. Defense Secretary Hegseth declared a “historic and overwhelming victory” and “capital V military victory.” Joint Chiefs Chairman Gen. Dan Caine, standing at the same lectern, called it a “pause” rather than an “end” and emphasized 13 KIA and continued operational risk. *Merkur* (Germany) explicitly contrasted them as “diametrically opposed.” This is the first publicly visible split between the Defense Secretary and the Joint Chiefs Chairman of the current administration on the framing of the war’s outcome.

A third divergence: **the 10-point plan itself**. Trump on April 7 called it “a workable basis on which to negotiate.” Press Secretary Leavitt during the overnight window called it “fundamentally unserious,” “unacceptable,” and “literally thrown in the garbage” — and said the working document is now a modified Iranian proposal aligned with a US 15-point counter-plan. Vice President Vance called it “fake news... probably written by ChatGPT.” German FDP politician Marie-Agnes Strack-Zimmermann surfaced an additional twist during the window: **the Farsi version of the Iranian plan permits enrichment, while the English version omits the relevant clause entirely.** *iFeng* (China)

corroborated. The two versions are circulating simultaneously and are being treated as authoritative by different parties.

A fourth divergence is on **who actually mediated the ceasefire**. Pakistani media (and Sharif personally) credit Field Marshal Asim Munir and Pakistan's National Security Adviser Asim Malik. *The New York Times*, citing administration sources, says **China was the decisive actor** — Foreign Minister Wang Yi conducted 26 phone calls during the war and “actively persuaded” Tehran to accept the framework after initially playing only a guarantor role. *Financial Times* reports the United States itself was pressuring Pakistan for weeks. *ABC Australia* gives China the primary credit. The competing narratives matter because they imply different power structures going into the post-war order — and only one of them positions Pakistan as a viable long-term regional broker.

A fifth divergence: **Hormuz status**. Trump and Leavitt repeatedly claimed during the window that the Strait is “open and safe” with an “uptick of traffic.” ADNOC CEO Sultan Al Jaber publicly said it is “not open.” Kpler shows 4 vessels Wednesday; Windward shows 11; pre-war was 130–138. Iran's own SNSC and IRGC have published a danger-zone map directing all ships to alternative routes. There is no way to reconcile “open and safe” with the objective shipping data. The White House is asserting facts that are flatly contradicted by every available data source.

OUTLOOK FOR THE NEXT 24 HOURS

The most likely scenarios entering the morning of April 9 EDT, in rough order of probability:

1. **Iran formally withdraws from the Friday/Saturday Islamabad talks.** The Khatibzadeh “genocide” framing, Araghchi's binary ultimatum, the ambassador's deleted X post, and Ghalibaf's enumeration of three violated points all point to a pre-announced exit. Iran does not withdraw from the ceasefire itself but conditions return on a full Lebanon ceasefire. This produces a second oil-price spike late Friday.
2. **Israel pauses Lebanon strikes for 12–24 hours under direct EU pressure**, Iran tentatively confirms attendance, and the talks open Saturday morning at the Serena Hotel with substantially reduced ambition. The Lebanon dispute is deferred but unresolved.
3. **A confirmed killing of Hezbollah Secretary General Naim Qassem** — the unconfirmed Reuters/ABP flash — is corroborated within hours, triggering an Iranian reciprocal escalation against either US Gulf forces or Israel proper.
4. **A new Iranian retaliatory strike against Gulf infrastructure** (a tanker, a desalination plant, a gas processing facility) framed as a response to specific Lebanon strikes. Moderate-probability tail event with high market impact.
5. **A partial Trump cabinet reorganization** as the 25th Amendment / impeachment pressure forces the appearance of accountability. Defense Secretary Hegseth remains the most likely scapegoat — the CBS Shuaiba scandal and the Pentagon-internal Hegseth-Caine split provide a politically defensible exit pretext.
6. **NATO Secretary General Rutte issues a public statement clarifying European naval commitments** (or, more likely, the absence of them) in response to Trump's “within days” ultimatum. The choreography of the statement determines whether the alliance moves toward formal rupture or papered-over continuity.

The single highest-probability stressor remains Lebanon. If Iran goes through with the public withdrawal threat, the Friday talks do not happen and the ceasefire is functionally dead within 36 hours of signing. If Israel pauses for even a token 24-hour window, the talks survive but the Lebanon question remains unresolved and the truce becomes a slow-bleed equilibrium rather than a path to peace.

The second-order question is the Mojtaba Khamenei succession. If the Reuters-flash claim that Hezbollah's Qassem has been killed is confirmed, AND Mojtaba's public absence is in fact incapacitation or death, then the

Iranian state is being represented at the Islamabad talks by a delegation whose actual authorizing principal is unclear — and the IRGC senior officer corps becomes the operative center of decision-making by default. Brookings’s Telhami’s earlier flag (the elder Khamenei’s anti-nuclear *fatwa* dies with him) becomes a more urgent concern under that scenario.

The window closed with the ceasefire technically intact, the Hormuz structurally closed, the Lebanon front active again, the Islamabad talks scheduled but conditional, the Iranian succession uncertain, the Trump administration domestically embattled, and the trans-Atlantic alliance under acute stress. Every one of these is worse than at the moment the SITREP was generated 11 hours ago.
